- Writing a business plan is the first and most important step of starting a business.
 - A business plan is an organised outline showing a description of a business and includes the following, the 4 P's of Marketing which are:

Activity 1: Write your business plan

- During this current time, lots of people are struggling to do their usual day-to-day activities, including shopping for groceries, going to work, or exercising as normal.

Social Enterprises combine societal goals - making society better - with the entrepreneurial spirit of setting up an organisation or business.

These organisations focus on benefits to societies, communities or the environment.

Their main objective is to have a social impact - **to improve society** - rather than make a profit.

Example: FoodCloud who connects supermarkets with charities in their area. The service ensures that food stuffs, which may ordinarily be thrown out, are passed on to the charities who can use them.

Activity 2: Business Poster

Go a step further and create a poster to present your idea on. Be creative and think about these questions when making your poster:

Who you are advertising to; Where people can find your store;

What you are advertising; When you are advertising;

Why are you advertising?
